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*2018-19 has been an eventful year. We concluded an Organisational Development exercise and a series of internal reflection workshops guided by consultants to finalise thematic areas of our work and a generic strategic plan for Shishu Sarothi.*

*Inclusive Education - promoting inclusion and evolving into a resource centre*

*Awareness and Advocacy - empowering rights holders and informing duty bearers*

*Research and Documentation – creating empirical evidence and influencing policy*

*An external evaluation of our work at the Centre for Inclusive and Vocational Education by Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives was encouraging and led to internal reviews to incorporate suggestions and improve services.*

*I look forward to consolidating and strengthening the unique nature of our organisation, as we stride the twin tracks of service delivery and a rights based approach in our work.*

***The Centre for Inclusive & Vocational Education-CIVE provides all-round educational and therapeutic inputs for children with developmental disabilities, including a 'Reverse Inclusion' Playgroup, an equipped Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Lab, a school readiness program for children with Autism Spectrum and other pervasive disorders, and a Vocational Training Unit for young adults.***

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*In 2018*

- 28 new trainees were enrolled in the Vocational training Unit
- 10 new students were enrolled at the ICT Lab
- 5 students from CIVE were mainstreamed and are currently studying in regular schools
- Yoga Classes for all units of CIVE were initiated in November 2018



### *Regional Action on Inclusive Education (RAISE-NE)*

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RAISE –NE is a collaborative project involving 15 NGOs working across 5 states of NE India, to complement the Inclusive Education component for children with disabilities in Samagra Siksha Abhiyan (SSA) in 75 SSA schools select districts of Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya, Nagaland and Tripura. In addition to providing active support to SSA school teachers through our Key Teachers, Shishu Sarothi has also been leading the Advocacy component of this project. Some of the major highlights of this project during the year were conducting the Zonal Children's Meet and organising the Ring the Bell Campaign.



Child Champion Nikhil Bansal participated in an Inclusive Zonal Children's meet at Kohima in October 2018. Later Nikhil went on to the Inclusive National Children's Parliament Meet in New Delhi in January 2019, where he met with parliamentarians to advocate for the Children's Manifesto. He also participated at CATS (Children as Actors for Transforming Society) ASIA Forum 2019 in Panchgani in February, 2019.



Ring the Bell Campaign was organised from 13th to 19th March 2019 in the SSA schools and culminated with an enthusiastic signature campaign. The campaign was organized to sensitize communities on the enrolment of children with disability and to create awareness among teachers to provide equal opportunities for children with disabilities to participate in all class room activities.

## *Training/Human Resource Development Division (HRD)*

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15 of the 16 educators who enrolled cleared the Advanced Certificate Course in Inclusive Education (ACCIE) in August 2018

- Students of D. Ed in Special Education (CP) course were taken for an exposure visit to Special Schools and Institutions in Kolkata
- The second batch of students of DSE – CP successfully passed their final examination and have been employed in various institutions

## *Bharati Infratel Scholarship Programme (BISP)*

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BISP supports higher education of students with disabilities across North East India

- 196 students have received the BISP scholarship
- 95 of 196 students have completed their course

The program has also conducted awareness programs on rights for persons with disabilities vis-a-vis employment opportunities and schemes for empowerment. Career counselling and soft skill sessions have also been taken up across the north-eastern states for these students.

A book titled, “Enabling Change-Stories of Empowerment”, as success stories is also being published to give an insight of the impact that the program has brought with its support.



## *SPARSH Program for Persons with Deafblindness and Multiple-Sensory Impairment*

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SPARSH unit provides comprehensive need based services to persons with Deafblindness (Db) and Multi-Sensory Impairment (MSI) in 2 districts of Kamrup and Kamrup (Metro). In addition to the regular activities of following up with the Dfblind persons, the SPARSH Unit conducted -

- A 3 day long North East Regional Training on Deafblindness from 27th to 29th November, 2018 at Shishu Sarothi
- The Assam State Medical and Paramedical Training on Deafblindness on 14th December, 2018 at Shishu Sarothi

## *Kolkata Talks*

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In association with the US Consulate Kolkata Shishu Sarothi conducted a TEDTalk-like event to raises awareness about inclusion and accessibility and induces changes in social behavior. On the 1st of March, 2019 the Kolkata Talks show brought together experts from the U.S. Consulate Alumni community and disability advocates, led by our Board Member Arman Ali, to discuss the inclusion of persons with disabilities. The speaking event is to be followed by Alumni-led follow-on workshops. The objective of this project was to use awareness building to diminish the socio-cultural constraints of persons with disabilities and improve accessibility in public spaces in east and north-east India.



Shishu Sarothi also launched the English Access Micro scholarship Program (Access) in October 2018 in association with the US Consulate for providing functional English language knowledge for students with and without disabilities in the age group of 13 to 20 years old from weaker economic sections of society. Access provides a foundation of English language skills to bright economically disadvantaged / deserving students primarily 13 to 20 years olds worldwide through after-school classes and intensive session in their countries. Access programs expose students to US culture and democratic values, improve the student's potential to participate successfully in socio-economic development of their countries and increase their chances of competing for and participating in future US Exchange and study programs. Shishu Sarothi coordinates the Access Program in two facilities - one in Shillong in association with the Hill Crest School and the other program is offered at Shishu Sarothi.

*Early Intervention services*

***Early Intervention services are aimed at offering assessment, screening, appropriate therapy inputs and home management programs for infants, high risk babies and young children with delayed development milestones.***

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- 257 new children were enrolled
- 121 follow up cases attended
- 4454 total sessions conducted
- Afternoon sessions initiated to enhance cognitive, social and ADL skills for children .
- Free play stimulation programs organized

- 317 children were enrolled
- 65 neonates referred from Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, of the Pediatrics Dept of GMCH
- 750 total sessions conducted
- 209 High risk babies assessed and families counselled

## *Out Reach Programme (Goalpara)*

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(Weekly early intervention services for young children with disability in collaboration with a local organisation)

- 181 children enrolled and provided with therapeutic services
- 39 children from neighbouring districts of Korajhar, Chirang, Barpeta, Dhubri and Bongaigaon availed services
- 11 Children from Meghalaya also availed services



2 Physiotherapists received their certificates on completion of the 1 year long Child Development Aide training at Umeed, Mumbai.

Counselling services provided at Shishu Sarothi included a range of individual and group counselling for parents and psychological evaluation and assessment of children. Parents support group meetings, regular counselling sessions for families and children availing the Early Intervention and Centre for Inclusive and Vocational Education children were conducted. The Counselling team in collaboration with SSA Block Elementary Education Office, Rani Block, Kamrup District conducted a camp for IQ Assessment for children with intellectual disabilities there to facilitate appropriate interventions and certifications.

*The Disability Law Unit – North East (DLU-NE)*

***The Disability Law Unit – North East (DLU-NE) carries out advocacy and legal literacy on rights of persons with disabilities awareness raising programs in an effort to influence policies relating to persons with disabilities. Additionally, the DLU-NE team also provides legal counsel, and litigation support for grievance redressal.***

300 participants including persons with disabilities, NGOs and DPOs attended a state level seminar organized with support from the Social Welfare Department, Assam and a regional seminar organized in partnership with National Centre for Promotion of Employment for Disabled People (NCPEDP). The seminars were on “The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016” and status quo of implementation of the RPWD Act, 2016.

4000 officials and members of the public in Assam were sensitised on conducting Accessible Elections in two phases - five zones in October, 2018 and eight zones in March, 2019 in collaboration with the Election Department of Government of Assam. Street plays were also organised at various locations to take the message forward.



### 3 major milestones achieved with legal intervention by DLU-NE

First ever Disability Certificate issued for person with Thalassemia - new disability recognized under the RPD Act 2016 – in Assam in response to legal action taken on behalf of PhD Scholar with Thalassemia, applying for UGC Scholarship at Tezpur University.

Inclusion of privately owned public establishments in the ambit of the RPD Act, in Court ruling in case relating to denial of access to services in a leading Gym chain in Guwahati. Hon'ble Gauhati High Court ruled that authorities do not have appropriate understanding of importance and significance of RPD Act 2016, and directed Social Welfare Dept of Govt of Assam to conduct sensitization programs for its officials and issue general circulars to all Govt and private establishments highlighting salient features of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016, and ensure that public buildings, facilities and services are accessible to persons with disabilities.

Historic judgement of Hon'ble Gauhati Court overturning hitherto ineligibility of persons with hearing impairment to become Teachers /Assistant Teachers under the Teachers' Eligibility Test norms of Govt of Assam, in response to petition of person with hearing impairment who was then allowed to appear before the State Level Medical Board for verification of disability status.

***Shishu Sarothi recognises that the need of the hour is to carry out evidence based research to initiate dialogues and influence policies and services for Persons with Disabilities.***

***Disaggregated data on disability is sparse. Internal reflections during the Strategic Planning exercise held during the year also led to the inclusion of Research and Documentation as a strategic area for Shishu Sarothi in the future.***



During the year a Research Study titled 'SDG Disability Tracker II' was carried out in collaboration with Voluntary Services Overseas (VSO). The study focused on the situation of Persons with Disabilities in the context of SDG 5, 6 and 8 in the post conflict districts of Chirang and Kokrajhar, Assam. The final report of this study was released on 27th March, 2019.



## *Shishu Sarothi organises inclusive annual sports meet*

GUWAHATI, Feb 20: Shishu Sarothi organised its 'Inclusive Annual Sports Meet' in association with Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiative and RAISE-North East on February 18 and 20.

The event saw the participation of over 90 children from the centre and children from four Sarva Siksha Abhiyan Schools – Rupnagar ME School, Rupnagar Birubari (Gayaram) School, Na-

tun Fatasil High School and 1, Hengrabari LP School as part of the RAISE-North East Project.

RAISE-North East is a project to compliment the Inclusive Education Component of Sarva Siksha Abhiyan and is supported by three INGOs, i.e., Light for the World, CBM and Jan Vikas Samiti.

The sports meet had several interesting activities ranging from Bocce, Musical Chair with Universal Design, 9 Pins, Assisted Walking,

Wheelchair Race, Running Race, Breaking the Pot and Cricket.

The highlight of the meet was the coming together of both children with and without disability, having a competitive spirit as well as creating an exciting and fun-filled environment for all.

"All the activities were designed in such a way that even children with high support needs could participate to the best of their abilities. Teachers and parents participated

in a game of musical chairs to show their enthusiasm for the meet. The core objective of this event was to use the medium of sports to truly bring forth inclusiveness among children with and without disability," a Shishu Sarothi spokesperson said.

This was followed by the closing ceremony presided over by former director and founding member of Shishu Sarothi, Mira Kagti, and other dignitaries where prizes were distributed. ❖

# Shishu Sarothi campaign for kids with disabilities concludes

GUWAHATI, March 20: The 'Ring the Bell' campaign conducted by Shishu Sarothi concluded on Tuesday.

The week-long campaign aimed at including children with disabilities in educational institutions. It complemented the Centre's flagship programme Sarva Siksha Abhiyan (SSA).

The campaign was held in collaboration with SSA Assam and was organized at six partner SSA schools under the RAISE-NE Project. The campaign culminated at Shishu Sarothi.

"RAISE (Regional Action on Inclusive Education)-NE is a project to promote inclusive education in select districts of Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya, Nagaland and Tripura and aims at improving the quality of education for children with disabilities in government and

government-supported schools. The project is supported by three INGOs – Light for the World, CBM and Liliane Fonds," a Shishu Sa-

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rothi spokesperson said.

The Ring the Bell campaign is a pioneering initiative by Liliane Fonds, one of the INGO partners of RAISE-NE, to ensure the educational initiatives for children with disability across the world

since 2012. The full participation of the students in the campaign draws the attention of the community, local governing body, media, etc., to enrol children with disabilities in educational institutions.

"It is a fact that the peers with a disability are not able to or not allowed to attend school because of various social factors such as non-accessibility, exclusion, etc. The campaign is aimed at increasing enrolment and retention of children with disabilities in mainstream schools, gaining community and parents' commitment to ensure inclusive education, ensuring that children with disabilities in schools are learning with their peers, and organizing rallies to spread awareness on social inclusion and Right to Education of children with disabilities," the spokesperson added.

The campaign further focused on making the schools

accessible (a child with disability should be able to access every part of the school) and child-friendly, besides reducing dropouts of children with disabilities in the regular schools due to lack of accessible toilets, ramps and child-friendly classrooms.

As part of the campaign, schoolchildren made lots of noise together for one minute in their schoolyard with bells and drums, etc., in order to sensitize the community on the enrolment of children with disability and to create awareness among teachers to provide equal opportunities for children with disabilities to participate in all classroom activities.

This was followed by a signature campaign where 1,500 students, including children with disabilities and their parents, 100 teachers and other members of the community participated.
